



From the Interim Pastor's Desk . .



Pastor Rebecca will begin to briefly answer the submitted questions "Ask me anything....about the Bible!" Some of the questions may require months of newsletters articles and a 250 page essay to answer, but she will do her best to answer them in two pages or less. If you would like to discuss a question in person, please visit her at during office hours. Please remember some of the topics covered may be sensitive to some individuals and you may have a different perspective on it, but this forum is to get the Pastor's reflection on the question.

When Jesus drew his last breath on the cross there was darkness, the temple curtain ripped, graves were opened, and people emerged. This is fascinating, but it only gets one line in the Bible. Can you explain anything else about this phenomenon?"

Warning: This was the hardest question in the box, so questions can only get easier after this one.

This guestion treats Mark 15:38-39 and Matthew 27:51-54.

The previous question addressed apocalypticism. To review, apocalypticism arose amidst a virulent persecution of the Jews. It sought to answer the question: Where is God amidst this magnitude of suffering and injustice? The answer it came up with is as follows: History is in the vice grip of evil. Evil has marshalled the fullness of its forces. This will signal God to unleash the final cataclysm that will usher in the Kingdom of God. Now be careful here. Apocalypticism does not assert that God will merely destroy evil. It asserts that God will end time, history, creation...all that there is. These things will give way to the Kingdom of God, which had always been God's end goal for time, history, creation....all that there is.

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Three of the gospels, Matthew, Mark, and Luke are apocalyptic in nature. They modified an apocalyptic framework as follows: The Christ event is a preliminary apocalyptic cataclysm. In other words, it is a preliminary in break of the Kingdom of God. It inaugurates the Kingdom of God which will culminate in the final cataclysm that will end it all in the Second Coming of Christ. In order to convey that, at the death of Jesus there is apocalyptic imagery -- the dead emerging from their tombs for the final judgment, for instance. That is an apocalyptic image because apocalypticism houses in the final cataclysm the resurrection of the dead to a final judgment.

As to the tearing of the temple curtain and the Centurion's recognition that Jesus was the Son of God, that's a whole different matter. The inner sanctum of the temple was closed by a curtain. It was thought to contain God's presence. When the curtain was torn, God's presence was abroad. By that presence, the Centurion, a Gentile, confessed that Jesus was the Son of God. Sit down, because this is a shocker. This is nothing less than Matthew and Mark's version of the Pentecost wherein Jesus endowed history with his Holy Spirit by which the Gentiles declared Jesus was the Son of God. Matthew and Mark don't exactly spell it out as Luke does in the book of Acts, but this is the way they assert it.

As you can see, the gospel's are extremely complex theologically. There's more there than the casual reader can see. No one asked me about the gospel of John, but it is the most sophisticated theological statement ever made.

Next month's question on what the Bible says about homosexuality will be a skate after this....



November 19, 2023

Present: Aaron Tigert, Steve Holzhueter, Deb Krebs, Karsten Haugen, Jaimie Hallik, Wade Winchip, Pastor Rebecca, Carol Johnson,

Called to order 10:46am- Aaron Tigert.

Approval of 10.15.2023 minutes: (Deb Krebs/Steve Holzhueter)

Pastor's Report: Pastor Rebecca reported that we are approaching optimal load within the capacity level of activities within the committees. This is a positive statement as all are engaged and working hard. The mission team has begun to meet now as well. Pastor Rebecca is doing consulting with the teams via zoom rather than being on site for each of the meetings. This is working well. She will also be starting a book discussion via zoom after the holidays. She is keeping up with visits and office hours.

Secretary's Report: Approved: (Deb Krebs/Steve Holzhueter)

Treasurer's Report: Approved (Carol Johnson/Deb Krebs). Steve reported on the current financials sharing that spending is up from last year but doing ok financially. He went on to share that attendance continues to be up from last year as are contributions. The goal for 2024 will be to build-up property, legacy, and memorial funds. Steve mentioned that a PD for an Event Coordinator is being prepared. The funding will come out of rental fees. There will be a marketing budget request/ presentation by the Visibility committee at the annual meeting in January. Steve will prepare and bring a draft budget to the Council at the December meeting. Tracy Yaktus will be replacing Steve as treasurer on the Council.

Wade Winchip: A discussion about the organ acquisition process ensued.

MOTION: The council retracts previously approved motion approving the expenditure of up to \$125,000 for the purchase and restoration of a pipe organ. (Wade Winchip/Steve Holzhueter). Abstained – Deb Krebs.

It was agreed by all that those involved with organ acquisition discussions should come back to the Council with more options and more price points for consideration. It was also agreed by all that these options, and costs, will go in front of the congregation for consideration and discussion.

MOTION: The Council, vis this motion, is asking those involved with the organ acquisition discussions to collaborate on options to replace the current organ and to bring a proposal to the council, and then the full congregation, for consideration and support. (Aaron Tigert/Karsten Haugen).

Call Process Update: Carol shared that the Call Committee was scheduled to meet Monday, December 4th.

Administration update:

Soup Luncheon will be on December 10th immediately following the Christmas Pageant. Christmas Eve lands on a Sunday this year. There will not be a morning worship service this day. The Christmas Candlelight will start at 4:00pm.

There was a generous donation to support a sound system in the Gathering Space.

Worship & Music Team Meeting Notes November 27, 2023

Opened meeting with a Prayer for Wisdom

Review of steps taken since last meeting

- 1. Bruce provided an assessment of our old organ and a proposal for a replacement pipe organ
- 2. Many people attended a demonstration of the pipe organ at Holy Name Heights
- Alternative options were presented to the church council, it was agreed that procedures to present the information to the committee should have preceded their meeting

History

- In choosing between a pipe organ and electronic or hybrid organ, it was pointed out that VLC will always seek top quality (as with most projects) to maintain their strong musical heritage
- 2. Will talk with Liz about finding the records on the old organ purchase in the church history

Concerns of committee and membership

- Remodeling or changing architecture is a primary concern We plan to maintain the structure as it is, will search for a smaller organ (new or refurbished) that will fit into the existing area Bruce will keep searching for a 7-Rank pipe organ of similar size to what we have
- Downtime during construction
 Piano can be used to lead services for a period of time
 Without a need for remodeling, removing the organ, conditioning of the area for a new organ, and
 installing a new organ should not be disruptive to services
- Cost of the project

We do have funds committed to an organ purchase Additional funds will be required – targeting \$250,000 (we are halfway there) Fund-raising chairperson would be needed -- Jill will contact a member for this position Must clarify the council's position on the status of finances Must raise funds for an organ without impacting regular contributions

Consideration of Options

1. Larger vs. Smaller instrument

We will continue searching for an organ of the same size to avoid the cost of remodeling and to avoid disturbing the architectural look of the front of the church

2. May consider a NEW smaller (7-rank) organ as well as used Bruce knows organ builders to contact who work with both new and rebuilt organs Schantz Music - Jeff Dexter (working on an organ in Wisconsin now) Dobson Organs - located in lowa and has worked on many organs in Wisconsin Organ builders are 1 1/2 - 2 years out in the process 3. Digital organs and Hybrid organs (pros and cons) Costs less (maybe half of pipe organ cost) Would easily fit the space We could foresee many problems with electronics Service life and obsolescence Technology quickly becomes "dated" Maintenance may be a problem without local dealer Sound quality may not be what is expected Typical builders, Allen and Rodgers, may be considered lower quality organ builders Regardless, we should see a demonstration and hear what the company representative says about the newer digital options Aim for a Friday afternoon or Saturday morning the second week of January Contact is Steve Smith at Triune Music in Michigan Mr. Smith recommended we see the hybrid organ at Immaculate of Mary Church in Monona Used and Refurbished 7-rank pipe organ 4. Bruce, who restores organs, reports that it may be possible to re-use some of present components or pipes The console must definitely be replaced - old and odd, once in choir space under the pipes, then set into lower space Steps with purchase and restoration of used organ (Est. cost = \$250K) 1. Removal from current church or location 2. Transportation 3. Refurbish and Restore components 4. Re-build and Install into church Our church will need to Dismantle and remove current organ Prepare space as needed (walls and floor, additional lighting, etc) Consider climate for the organ The air conditioner blasting cold air into the area is not ideal Humidity should be maintained - work not guaranteed if it drops below 25%

Actions moving forward

 Communicate in message to congregation Increase awareness of why we need to replace the organ What are we looking at for replacing the organ What the costs may look like

We will be voting on approval for costs of entire project and fund-raising

Meeting notes will be provided to keep updated on project

COMMITEES/TEAM REPORTS (continued)

- 3. Prepare a presentation for the council and annual meeting to begin a fund-raising campaign
- Set in place a process to "fast-track" if needed, while still following appropriate procedures The church council had approved up to \$25K for a purchase of an organ Obviously, the total costs for the project will run higher and must get approval

Worship service

There has been some discussion regarding reading from the Apocrypha in our lessons. These books are not included in our Canon, sometimes considered useful for instruction as history, they were removed from the Bible by the Protestant Church in the 1800's. The ELCA has begun including readings from them with the literature provided for our service. We will discuss with Pastor Rebecca to scrutinize them when included, or perhaps not use them at all.

Meet Our Presenter

And yet, at times I wonder if I love Advent, or maybe the *idea* of Advent, a bit too much. Every year I make all kinds of Advent plans for how I'm going to honor this season of waiting. Like many of you, I get emails from all kinds of Christian publishers and writers sharing about the new and delightful things they have created for the season of Advent. And, in my Advent optimism, I buy, download, save...a lot of them. This year, I have at the ready no less than three Advent devotionals, plus an

Advent cross-stitch kit – every day you stitch a little more of the scene until the picture is complete by Christmas Eve.

Every year I prepare for the Most Meaningful Advent Ever and...many years I end up with an Advent coloring book abandoned by Day 3, an ornament-a-day Advent garland with maybe six ornaments on it (one year, I didn't make it past one), and will find on December 20 that the last daily devotional I read was from December 10...and that was after I'd already missed days 3-9.

Perhaps that's why the title of the Kate Bowler resource, "Bless the Advent We Actually Have" spoke to me. (Yes, that is one of the aforementioned three devotionals for this year.) **So often we get caught up in the idea of how things should be, or look, or feel, that we lose sight of the beauty, the holiness of what is.** The "not yet" part of this season is important. Looking forward in hope to the time that Christ will return and make all things right is sometimes the only thing we have to cling to. And yet, we also live in the now.

The years that my Advent plans went awry was because life was happening around me: preparations for worship, Christmas concerts for my children, snowstorms, colds and flus, time with loved ones, and more. The season, in all of its anticipation and preparation and hopefulness, was honored – just not in the way I had originally planned. And when Christmas Eve and Christmas Day finally arrived, the celebration of the birth of the One who was, and is, and is to come, was still glorious and full of wonder.

So, my friends in Christ, however you mark time this Advent – via a delightful bit of chocolate pried out from behind a tiny door each day, stitching together a picture on cloth, spending time in hope-filled prayer and devotion, or careening through these weeks ahead in a whirlwind of activity and frenzy – **may you trust that God-with-us, Emmanuel, is with you. Emmanuel is with you: blessing you, keeping you, and filling you with hope – right now.**

New in 2024: Affinity Groups

This year, in addition to the large-group presentation, **part of our time together will be spent with affinity groups.** Over the years we have consistently received feedback that LEAD attendees would love time to simply engage in conversation with others from around the synod. In response, this year we are planning to use the traditional workshop time for affinity groups!

What's an affinity group? Put simply, an affinity group is a group of people gathered around a shared interest. In our context, that would mean you would get together with people from around our synod who are engaged in similar ministries as you, whether it is teaching Sunday School, serving as a council president, working as a parish secretary, coordinating volunteers, singing in the choir, serving on stewardship...you get the idea!

Affinity groups can also be built around conversation topics, such as how to talk about vision and mission in your congregation, how to talk about social justice issues when not everyone agrees, how to partner with local organizations in your community and more.

When you register for the event, you will have an opportunity to share your role within your congregation or ministry in order to identify topics of interest about which you would love to connect with others in our synod. While we can't guarantee a group will form around every topic named, we will do our best to create opportunities that will encompass as many of the ideas lifted up as possible.

Registration Opens December 6

Registration for this year's LEAD event will open on Wednesday, December 6.

The cost of registration is \$25 per person **or** \$100 per congregation/ministry with five or more person registered.

Become a member of the Legacy Fund. Members of the Legacy Fund come from all walks of life and are united by a desire to preserve our beautiful Church, Cemetery and adjoining land. Vermont Lutheran Church owns and maintains a cemetery, historic church building, Gathering Place and 115 acres of adjacent land with a hilltop viewscape. Christian stewardship involves the faithful management of all the gifts God has given us, including accumulated, inherited and appreciated resources. Therefore, we created the Legacy Fund to encourage, receive and administer these gifts.

Our goal is to generate and maintain a Legacy Fund of \$1 Million dollars, or more. Through receipt of bequests, grants and/or gifts, contributions to the Legacy Fund and investment growth will serve three very important purposes now and into the future:

- 1. Expand the cemetery and develop and maintain the adjacent land in a manner that maximizes its natural beauty and preserves its ecological importance; and,
- 2. Provide funds to pay property taxes on the portion of the adjacent land subject to taxes; and,
- 3. Provide funds for future maintenance of the cemetery and building and grounds needs of the Church.

Any legacy member whose contribution totals \$1,000 or more will be recognized with a brass plate on a prominently displayed plaque. Annual meeting reports will include all the names of those individuals who made a contribution of any amount that year.
