From the Interim Pastor's Desk . .



Pastor Rebecca will begin to briefly answer the submitted questions "Ask me anything....about the Bible!" Some of the questions may require months of newsletters articles and a 250 page essay to answer, but she will do her best to answer them in two pages or less. If you would like to discuss a question in person, please visit her at during office hours. Please remember some of the topics covered may be sensitive to some individuals and you may have a different perspective on it, but this forum is to get the Pastor's reflection on the question.

One of the questions in the box was very long. It went to the issue of estrangement; namely, why is there so much of it out there, even and especially within families? And why has it gotten so much worse in recent years?

The Bible offers Cain as the archetypal representation of estrangement. Cain made a slipshod offering to God. His brother Abel made an adequate offering. Cain brooded. He fanned the flames of his jealousy and resentment until they grew into murderous hatred. We all know what happened next.

Cain then represents an enduring and pervasive manifestation of human nature. Rather than admire and emulate the meritorious and successful, present-day Cains despise them because it casts themselves in a dim light. They blame life for their own inadequacies. Of course, the Bible offers Cain as a model to avoid precisely because it gives rise to estrangement.

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus expressly forbids his followers to harbor anger. Paul warns not to let the sun set on it. We can't change the Cains around us, but we can change the Cains within us.

And why has estrangement become so much worse in recent years? In my own opinion, it has to do with Karl Marx and his acolytes. Do you really think that Marx had compassion for the working man? He who abused and betrayed his wife, who caused his own children to die from squalor, who was a virulent racist, and who called for the eradication of Judaism? Compassion was hardly his middle name.

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And do you really think that the temporary exploitation of the working man as industrialization unfolded (Legislation like the Factory Act and child labor laws were soon introduced to address that exploitation, not to mention the formation of unions) was sufficient to call for the working man to execute all those above him and to overthrow western society in a violent, merciless, and anarchical revolution? Karl Marx was Cain writ large. His thought has failed politically but has infiltrated nearly all of our institutions. It's in the air we breathe, and gives justification and license for not just estrangement, but vengeance -- but "vengeance is mine, saith the Lord." Lent is on the horizon. I will say more about Cain in a Lenten sermon.

What about children whose parents do not have them baptized or brought up in faith? What about people of other religions? I don't believe that God would abandon them.

Neither do I.

I love Jonathan Edwards as much as the next man, but philosophers and theologians have a penchant for following a train of thought to its logical conclusion. Doing so, he came up with this doozy -- "The road to hell is paved with the skulls of unbaptized babies."

The Bible does not address itself directly the fate of unbaptized babies and followers of other religions. Yes, Jesus declares that he is the way, the truth, and the life, but the Bible was written by and for the early Christians; in other words, it was written for the people of God. Jesus is their way, their truth, and their life. Followers of other religions are not in view.

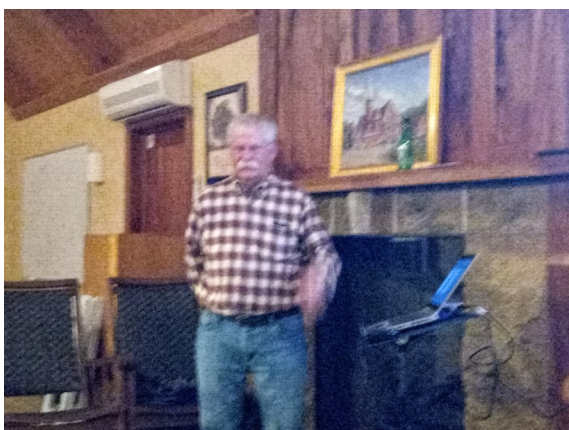
In Jesus' immortal parable *The Good Samaritan*, the Samaritan is a follower of another religion. He was the good guy. He was the example to follow. He was the corrective. The religious authorities were cast as hard-hearted hypocrites. According to the parable, the Samaritan is in, and the religious authorities are out.

This is the theme of the book of Ruth as well. Ruth was follower of another religion as well. She was the heroine.

Extrapolating, being an insider is no ticket in, and being an outsider is no ticket out. Paul alludes to a general revelation, a kind of Jeffersonian natural law, by which all can practice righteousness. This is true to my own experience as well. I have friends, colleagues, and family members who practice different faiths and are some of the most virtuous people I know. Finally, Jesus' followers who are preoccupied to exclude others from God's love and grace may find themselves surprised on Judgment Day. Perhaps the greatest American theologian of the twentieth century, William Stringfellow, wrote that it would be a day of upsets.

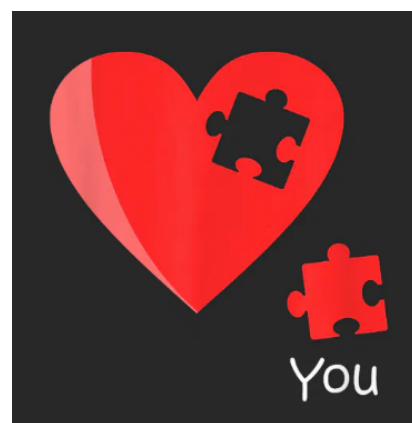
Perhaps it's love for a painting or an animal that you adore.

Mission Matters – February 2024

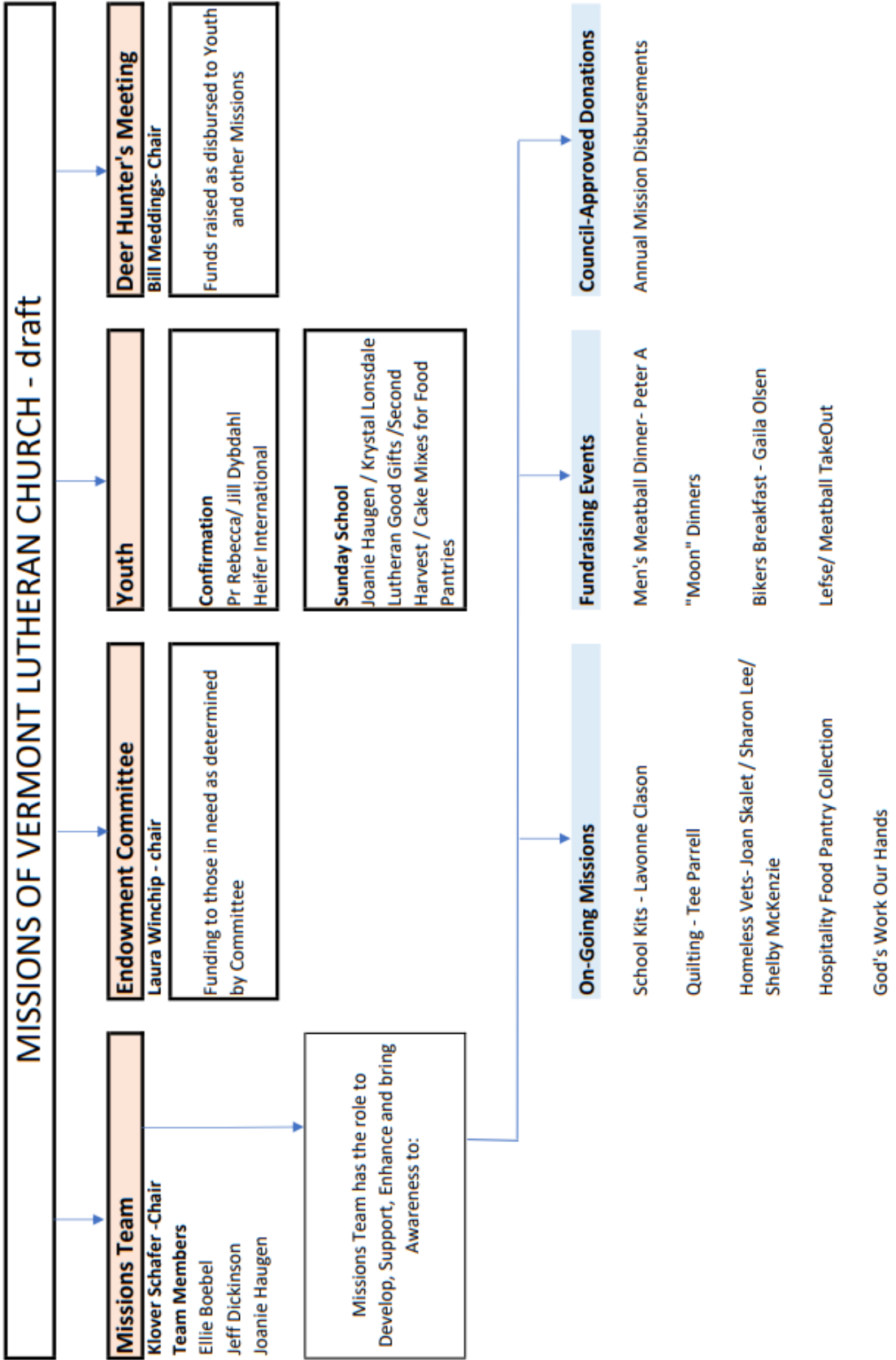

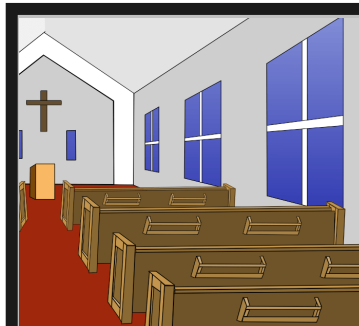

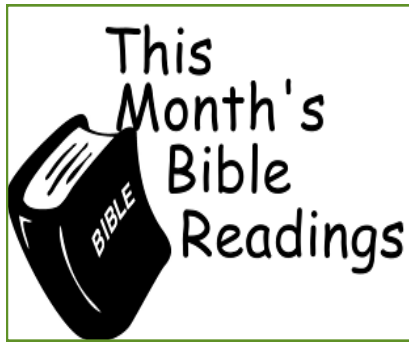

Become a member of the Legacy Fund. Members of the Legacy Fund come from all walks of life and are united by a desire to preserve our beautiful Church, Cemetery and adjoining land. Vermont Lutheran Church owns and maintains a cemetery, historic church building, Gathering Place and 115 acres of adjacent land with a hilltop viewscape. Christian stewardship involves the faithful management of all the gifts God has given us, including accumulated, inherited and appreciated resources. Therefore, we created the Legacy Fund to encourage, receive and administer these gifts.

Our goal is to generate and maintain a Legacy Fund of \$1 Million dollars, or more. Through receipt of bequests, grants and/or gifts, contributions to the Legacy Fund and investment growth will serve three very important purposes now and into the future:

1. Expand the cemetery and develop and maintain the adjacent land in a manner that maximizes its natural beauty and preserves its ecological importance; and,
2. Provide funds to pay property taxes on the portion of the adjacent land subject to taxes; and,
3. Provide funds for future maintenance of the cemetery and building and grounds needs of the Church.

Any legacy member whose contribution totals \$1,000 or more will be recognized with a brass plate on a prominently displayed plaque. Annual meeting reports will include all the names of those individuals who made a contribution of any amount that year.
