## A Letter From Pastor Rebecca...

Why Do Lutherans Have Two Sacraments While Roman Catholics Have Seven?

If you've had much exposure to Roman Catholicism, you might have noticed a difference in how many sacraments we each recognize. Roman Catholics acknowledge seven sacraments: Baptism, Eucharist (Communion), Confirmation, Penance (Confession), Anointing of the Sick, Marriage, and Holy Orders. We Lutherans, by contrast, acknowledge only two sacraments: Baptism and the Lord's Supper. So why the difference?

The heart of the matter lies in how we define a sacrament. Martin Luther defined a sacrament as:

1. A sacred act instituted by Christ
2. Involving a visible element (like water, bread, or wine)
3. That conveys God's grace and forgiveness.

By this definition, only Baptism and the Lord's Supper qualify as sacraments. Both were clearly instituted by Jesus, involve visible elements (water in Baptism, bread and wine in the Lord's Supper), and promise the forgiveness of sins. Other rites, such as marriage or confirmation, are blessed by God, but they are not sacraments in the Lutheran sense.

For Roman Catholics, the definition of a sacrament is broader. They teach that sacraments are outward signs instituted by Christ or the Church that confer grace. This leads their list of seven.

Why does this matter? Because Lutherans believe that God's grace comes to us most clearly in His Word and in the sacraments He has given us. We elevate the sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper as direct channels of God's grace and forgiveness.

So, while we honor and give thanks for many other church rites—confirmation, marriage, ordination—they are not sacraments in the strict sense. They serve the church and help us live out our faith, but they are not the primary ways God delivers His grace to us.

In the last analysis, Vive La Difference. No doubt God lauds all things that point to his Son.

## COMMITTEES AND TEAMS *From the President's Desk*

**How Committees are Different than Teams:** The basic difference is the authority under which the committee or team was created.

**Committees** are a direct function of our Constitution, or a Resolution adopted by the congregation. There are several committees listed in Chapter 13 of our Constitution: *the Executive, Nominating, Audit, Mutual Ministry, Cemetery, and Call committees*. In Chapter 13, you'll also see that the members of each committee are elected to or appointed to the committee and any term limit that applies. Further, the committees are also provided for in Chapter 13 of our Bylaws.

Missing from the list above is our *Endowment Committee*. In our Constitution, Chapter 5 specifies that we will have an Endowment Fund that operates in accordance with a continuing resolution. Our congregation adopted the Endowment Fund Resolution years ago. The resolution includes the particulars of Endowment Committee Membership, including being elected to the committee at a congregational annual meeting and the term of each member.

So, the committees have legal standing, members are often elected to their position by the congregation, and report directly to the Council.

**Teams** are neither a function of our Constitution, Bylaws, or Resolutions. The Teams were simply created by the Council (most formed in mid-2023). In other words, rather than the authority to create a team coming from a legal document (the Constitution, Bylaw or Resolution), the teams are a construct created by the Council to involve more of the congregation in an organized fashion to do God's Work.

Members of the teams are volunteers (not elected), the team chair is "elected" by the team, no term applies, and members can resign at any time. Each team has a charter describing its mission, vision and function, meets at least twice a year, keeps meeting minutes that are reported to the Council and either published in the monthly Messenger or posted in the fellowship hall, often has a line item in our operating budget, and has a Council liaison assigned to foster communication to the Council.

### Resolutions

#### Resolution to Support a US Constitutional Amendment to Limit Money in Politics

The assembly **adopted** a resolution encouraging members of the SCSW to learn about issues of money in politics and to advocate for a constitutional amendment to limit the way money is used in the political process.

#### Resolution for Part-time Synod Justice Coordinator Staff Position

The assembly **did NOT adopt** a resolution to investigate the feasibility of including a staff position dedicated to coordinating the justice work of our synod ministry teams.

#### Resolution for A Confession of Faith for Our Time

The assembly **adopted** a resolution to publicly declare ourselves a "confessing church," to encourage congregations to nonviolently resist government policies that demean the God-given dignity of all human beings, and to memorialize the 2025 Churchwide Assembly to also adopt "A Confession of Faith for Our Time."

#### Resolution Regarding Christian Nationalism

The assembly **adopted** a resolution to direct synod council, ministry teams, and synod staff to study the issue of Christian Nationalism and to strongly encourage the congregations of the synod to do the same.

#### Resolution for a National day of Remembrance for Indian Boarding Schools

The assembly **adopted** a resolution to memorialize the 2025 Churchwide Assembly to address the legacies of our church's role in Indian Boarding Schools through a variety of activities, including observation of the National Day of Remembrance for Indian Boarding Schools and support of the ELCA's Truth-Seeking and Truth-Telling Initiative.
