Ask the Pastor Anything...

What are the key points about Martin Luther?

It all started with Johann Tetzel. Who was Johann Tetzel, you ask? He was an indulgence salesman. For a modest contribution, Tetzel could sell you an indulgence....in other words, time off from purgatory – and not just for you, but for your loved ones as well. He even had a catchy jingle – "As soon as a coin in the coffer springs, the soul from purgatory springs!" Tetzel was one slick salesman. He even offered indulges for sins not yet committed.

Enter Martin Luther. Luther smelled a rat, and where there's one rat, there's likely to be more. In all, Luther discovered 95 rats, which he tacked to the door at Wittenberg Cathedral. The Reformation was born, through which, as Luther's great biographer Roland Bainton put it, Luther "revived the Christian consciousness of Europe."

Luther was a faithful and fearless theological genius – the magnitude of which arises every millennium or so. His thought, however, is surprisingly accessible. Luther's basal insight is that Christians are justified by grace through faith. Luther didn't contrive this himself. He got it straight from the Apostle Paul. Roman Catholicism offered an alternative to this -- that Christians are justified through priestcraft -- that is, when the priest rings the bell and turns the host into the literal body and blood of Christ.

And if Christians are justified by grace through faith, a whole constellation of extrapolations can be drawn. For one, the priesthood can be dispensed with altogether. There is no need for it. It provides no function. There is, rather, a priesthood of all believers. If Christians are justified by grace through faith, this can only be the case. For another, primacy goes not to the papacy, but to Scripture, through which grace through faith is revealed. For yet another, it all boils down to the conscience of the individual believer.

What Luther accomplished, in the tiniest nutshell possible, was a massive paradigm shift away from Roman Catholicism and back to the Apostle Paul, where it belongs. Though the Apostle Paul wouldn't take the credit. The credit goes to what he learned along the road to Damascus. A great legacy has been left us, and we are tasked to honor it.

From the President's Desk ~ July 2025

In March, we began a series of discussions we called "Strategic Plan". The idea was to recognize the many good things happening at Vermont Church. With the growth in the congregation and exciting new initiatives, like the organ, we saw an opportunity to examine how we work together to keep the positive momentum going.

We asked the members of the Council and leaders from each of the committees and teams to get together for three meetings on May 1, 22, and 29. Ron Boehnen and Polly Kawalek facilitated the discussions, which covered:

- 1. Current state: what do we like most, what could we do better, what have we seen elsewhere that we might learn from?
- 2. Potential future state: what ideas do we have for the future, either smaller improvements to try immediately or bigger ideas to follow the major initiatives now underway?
- 3. Identify priorities and discuss how to engage the whole congregation.

We have summaries of all the observations and ideas, which will be a great resource for future consideration.

Three conclusions emerged from those discussions as priorities to address:

First, we love our worship service. There were some wonderful ideas for enhancements.

Second, we see some communication opportunities that will help everyone better understand the work the teams and committees are doing.

Third, clarification of our service team practices would be much appreciated, especially by our new members.

Our next step is now to share these ideas with you. We know you will have some great perspectives, and we look forward to developing potential new approaches together. We will begin by creating a questionnaire/survey that outlines the ideas and requests your feedback. You can expect that process to begin later this summer.

Meeting Agenda listed additional ideas to keep in mind (not lose track of)


- Bob to meet with Janet in August to brainstorm further streamlining of onboarding process



I am in wonder of God's creation. A favorite hymn, **For the Beauty of the Earth**, depicts beautiful images of all that is provided us. It was written in 1864 by Folliot S. Pierpoint, and is found in our Lutheran hymnal. Each verse paints a picture of gratitude embodied in some aspect of God's creation: the earth, the senses, human love, the church, and the gift of God as manifest in Christ.

Pierpoint's words praise the Lord for all the wonderful things He has given us.

- Verse 1: the beauty of the earth and glory of the skies remind us of God's love.
- Verse 2: the specific wonders of nature should direct our thoughts to the one who created them
- Verse 3: the fact that our ability to enjoy the beauty of the earth and the wonder of each hour with our senses shows God's wisdom in creation
- Verse 4: the social joys and love of home, family and friendship
- Verse 5: the church, which is God's ordained agency to accomplish His purpose in this world
- Verse 6: the best gift that God has given mankind is the gift of His Son

Whatever form we may use, singing this song brings to our minds the thoughts and emotions aroused by the poet's pictures, and in so doing we praise God for the truly beauty of the earth. This joyous hymn is a great reminder of all the beauty that surrounds us and to not take this for granted!
