Ask the Pastor Anything...

Can you explain more about Holy Communion? What is supposed to be happening?

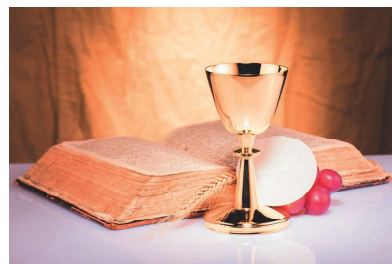
There is no one answer to this question. Consider that Roman Catholics have a vastly different understanding of Holy Communion than do Protestants.

Roman Catholics take their understanding of Holy Communion from John 6, particularly John 6:53-59: "Very truly, I tell you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood you have no life in you. Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood have eternal life, and I will raise them up on the last day."

It is easy to see in these words the basis for transubstantiation – the belief that it is necessary for the host to transform into the body and blood of Christ and be ingested. The issue here is that John was probably not being literal. John's is a highly abstract and metaphorical gospel. Jesus had just described himself as the Bread of Life. Of course, Jesus was not proclaiming that he was a loaf of bread. He was being metaphorical. The above quote is probably an extension of this metaphor. Nevertheless, Roman Catholics latched onto their understanding early on, and they never departed from it. If you read John's gospel in its entirety, this is John's *modus operandi* – to employ metaphors and abstractions so that the reader will leave behind mundane interpretations and ponder sublime mysteries.

Martin Luther did not think much of Roman Catholics' understanding of Holy Communion. He did not think much of Roman Catholicism in toto. Luther, however, denying transubstantiation, wanted to maintain the "real presence" of Christ in the sacrament, so he engaged in various convolutions around Christ's presence being "in, with, and under" the body and blood of Christ. Luther's issue is that he was making a dialectic response to Roman Catholicism. He wasn't employing his own tenant, *Sola Scriptura*.

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If you simply look at what the gospels, away from John's which was probably never intended to be the basis for the sacrament of Holy Communion, they say something similar to Matthew 26:26 et. seq.: While they were eating, Jesus took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take and eat; this is my body. Then he took a cup, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you. This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins. I tell you, I will not drink from this fruit of the vine from now on until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom." What Jesus would appear to be saying here is that Holy Communion is a remembrance of his crucifixion for our sins at which he promises he will be spiritually present. This is what I believe. It is consonant with what the gospels proclaim – Christ's crucifixion front and center.

Luther said that all biblical interpretations are fair game so long as they point to Christ as our Lord and Savior. This is what I believe too.

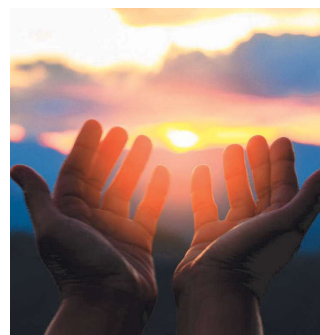
CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

From The President's Desk, September 2025

For the past month, there has been a good deal of confusion and anxiety concerning our call committee and the status of Pastor Rebecca. My hope is that this message brings some clarity to the situation and eases some of the anxiety.

First, let me say that we should have done a better job of keeping you more fully informed of the call process and Pastor Rebecca's role as our interim pastor. When Pastor Barry left at the end of 2022, our call committee was immediately formed to seek a new pastor.

Our constitution states, "At a time of pastoral vacancy, an interim pastor shall be appointed by the bishop of the synod with the consent of this congregation or the Congregation Council." Pastor Rebecca was appointed by our bishop, and our Council consented to have her become our interim pastor in April 2023. Not knowing how long it might take to call a new pastor, we contracted with Pastor Rebecca for a six-month period. When that contract expired, we contracted with her for a 12-month period which was renewed again in November 2024.

So, Pastor Rebecca has been serving as our interim pastor for 2 ½ years. Which leads to the obvious question, why not just call her to be our new pastor? The answer is that she is not seeking a settled call to rostered ministry due to the weight and longevity of the commitment. What we are exploring is using a provision in our constitution that allows for calling a pastor, with the synod's approval, for a specific term, such as a year or two.

Pastor Rebecca is committed to helping us find the right pastoral candidate and assisting us with the transition to a new pastor, when that occurs. She believes that the specific term pastoral contract is the best way forward.

And Pastor Rebecca, under a specific term call as our pastor, would continue to lead us, teach us, encourage us, challenge us, and perform all the duties she has so ably done in the past.

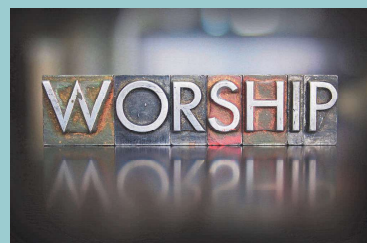

Quilt Ministry

Stitched with Love: Vermont Quilts for Lutheran World Relief

The Lutheran World Relief (LWR) quilting project began after World War II, when women in Lutheran congregations across America responded to the great need for blankets among war survivors in Europe. Their efforts grew into a mission of mercy that has now continued for more than seven decades. Today, these quilts are sent not to Europe, but to families in the Middle East, Asia, Africa, South America, Micronesia, and the United States—families who have lost everything to violence, floods, earthquakes, or other disasters.

Here at Vermont, our Monday morning quilters have faithfully contributed hundreds of quilts over the years. Every October, their handiwork is carefully packed and delivered to the train depot on Madison's east side, joining contributions from other southern Wisconsin congregations. From there, the quilts travel to Baltimore or Minneapolis, where they are compressed into bales, shrink-wrapped, and shipped overseas. Their final journey often takes them by truck to remote villages or crowded cities, where they are given directly to families in need.

LWR distributes nearly half a million quilts annually, and about a third of those come from right here in Wisconsin and Upper Michigan. Each quilt carries warmth, comfort, and the assurance that someone across the world cares.

LWR requests \$2.50 per quilt to help with shipping costs, though they will deliver quilts whether or not shipping is covered. Our quilters are seeking donations toward these expenses. As a special thank-you, a gift of \$100 or more allows you to take home a quilt of your choosing—a wonderful keepsake or gift, stitched with love. Donations are gratefully accepted through the church or directly to any of our quilters.

On Sunday, **September 7th**, our sanctuary will be transformed into a tapestry of color and comfort as this year's quilts are displayed and blessed during worship. It is one of the most beautiful services of the year—a visible reminder of how God's love is woven into acts of service and compassion. Thank you to everyone who donated fabric and supported this ministry.

Visibility Team

HYMN SPOTLIGHT: *"Open Your Ears, O Faithful People"* ELW 519

"Open Your Ears, O Faithful People" is a hymn full of joy and energy, calling us to hear and celebrate the living Word of God. Written in 1966 by Fr. Willard F. Jabusch, a Catholic priest from Chicago, it is both an invitation and proclamation: God's kingdom is here, and we are called to listen and respond.

The music comes from a Jewish folk tune often known as *"Torah Orah,"* with roots in traditional synagogue melodies. Its lively rhythm and dance-like feel make it unique among Christian hymns and reflect the biblical call: "Hear, O Israel: the Lord is our God, the Lord alone" (Deut. 6:4). In this way, the hymn bridges the heritage of Israel with the Good News of Christ, showing the continuity of God's covenant love.

With its upbeat, spirited character, *"Open Your Ears, O Faithful People"* is often used as a gathering hymn, inviting the whole assembly to sing with gladness. It's a reminder that worship is not only reverent, but also joyful—a celebration of God's Word alive among us.

Reflection Question:

As you listen to this, how might God be calling you to "open your ears" and listen more deeply for His Word in your daily life?
