What Is Lent?

Lent is a forty-day season of repentance and preparation for Holy Week and Easter. Sundays are not counted, because every Sunday is a celebration of Christ's resurrection. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday.

A Brief History

The word Lent comes from an old English word meaning spring, a time when days grow longer. From the earliest days of the church, Lent was a time of fasting and spiritual preparation.

Originally, people preparing for baptism at Easter spent Lent in prayer, study, and fasting. Those already baptized used this season to renew their faith by studying Scripture, the Creed, and the Lord's Prayer.

Over time, Lent grew from a short preparation into the forty-day season we know today. The forty days recall Jesus' forty-day fast in the wilderness and Moses' forty days on Mount Sinai.

Lent Today

The color purple is used during Lent. Purple represents both repentance and Christ's kingship, shown through the cross.

Lent is once again emphasized as a time of baptismal preparation and renewal. Many churches hold midweek Lenten services with this focus.

During Lent, the word "alleluia" is often not spoken or sung. It is set aside on Transfiguration Sunday and joyfully restored at Easter.

From The President's Desk, February 2026 Peter Antonie

Annual Meeting Summary

Two Things: I asked everyone in attendance to think of two things they hope will happen that will lead to us being a better congregation with a bright future before our annual meeting in 2027. I told the group that my two "hopes" are #1 that we are no longer a divided congregation, and #2 that we have called a pastor who is excited to lead us on our faith journey. I will work hard to make those two things happen and ask that all our members think of two things and then work hard to make those two things happen. By doing so, many good things will happen by next year!

Finances: Most of the meeting dealt with our financial state. At our 2025 annual meeting, we passed a deficit budget with anticipation that our operating expenses would exceed our expected income by over \$35,000. Due to member contributions increasing more than anticipated and expenses being less, primarily because we didn't have a pastor for the last 4 months of the year, the deficit was about \$18,000.

For 2026, Karsten Haugen presented a spending plan with 4 options to consider that differed on how much experience a pastor has and whether called to a parttime or fulltime ministry.

The vote was to adopt the option of a fulltime pastor called for the last 8 months of 2026 with the proviso that the council will provide a report to the congregation, no later than the end of May, on how the necessary income will be raised so that there is no deficit by year-end.

And we elected two new council members, Ingerid Kvam and Peter Jones. We thank them for the willingness to serve and look forward to their input.

Listening Sessions

The TAG Team, Council, and Call Committee will be working together to plan a series of meetings to allow for feedback from the congregation to seek solutions to help us heal and continue to grow together. These will likely be small-group meetings with specific questions presented ahead of time for members to reflect on. We plan to offer different times, locations and options for people to feel comfortable answering the questions. We are excited to share more information with you and to listen to your thoughts and insights!

Call Committee

The call committee and the council held a joint, closed meeting on January 11th because the bishop sent us a potential candidate to interview. We decided that the call committee isn't ready to interview a candidate and needs time to review our site profile to assure it accurately portrays Vermont Church. They will meet in early February to make any necessary amendments to the profile. I notified the candidate that we will be back in contact when we feel we are ready to interview them.



Sunday School



Our Sunday School students have been busy learning about the life of Jesus during these cold, wintry Sundays. While not much is known about Jesus' childhood, the children learned that He grew up helping His earthly father, Joseph, and learned the skill of carpentry. They also explored the story from the Gospel of Luke that tells how young Jesus stayed behind at the temple during a Passover pilgrimage, unbeknownst to His parents, to learn God's Word.



His parents were deeply distressed when they realized He was missing, but Jesus explained that they should have known to find Him in His Father's house, learning Scripture.

Through these lessons, the children learned that God loves them and wants them to grow in their knowledge of Him. They even tried their hands at carpentry by making birdhouses and learned more about Passover, including tasting dates and figs. Just as Jesus was eager to learn more about His Father, He calls us to actively learn about Him as well. By doing so, we can share the Light of Jesus with others. Let it shine!

During February and into March, the kids will dive into a friendship with God! Swimming deep into an amazing undersea adventure where they'll experience the ever-flowing, never-ending love of God.

- When you write down your ideas and goals, you have a much higher chance of actually doing the things you want to accomplish.
- Journaling can be one way to pray.
- Journaling is a way to sort through options when faced with an important decision.
- Several health benefits have been attributed to keeping a journal.







Exciting News in Our Worship Space!


