The Sundays after Easter invite us to linger in a powerful story, the story of beginnings. In these weeks, we turn to the book of Acts, the second volume of Luke's account, where the life of the early church unfolds in the wake of resurrection. It is a story not only about what happened then, but about what is still possible now.

Acts opens with a reminder that the risen Jesus did not simply depart, but remained present, teaching, guiding, and preparing his followers for what was to come. For forty days, he shaped their understanding, grounding them in hope and purpose. Then, with his ascension and the promise of the Holy Spirit, the apostles were sent into the world, not alone, but empowered (Acts 1:1-5).

That promise comes vividly to life in the second chapter of Acts. Pentecost is not a quiet or subtle moment. It is dynamic, surprising, and deeply transformative. The believers gathered together with openness and expectation, making room in their lives for God to move. And God did. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, ordinary people began speaking in languages they had never learned. What could have been chaos became connection. People from different regions, cultures, and backgrounds heard the good news in ways that spoke directly to them. In that moment, barriers fell. Differences did not disappear, but they were bridged.

The Spirit gave Peter courage to speak boldly. It stirred hearts to listen deeply. And in a single day, thousands responded, choosing a new way of life shaped by faith, community, and hope.

Pentecost reminds us that God's promises are not distant or abstract. They are living and active. The Holy Spirit does more than inspire, it unites. It crosses boundaries we struggle to overcome. It brings understanding where there was division, and possibility where there was uncertainty.

This raises an important and timely question for us: what might happen if we truly welcomed the Holy Spirit's presence and power in our lives today? In a world marked by differences, of language, opinion, background, and experience, what might be softened, healed, or transformed? In our churches, what new life might emerge if we made intentional space for God to move among us? What courage might we discover? What connections might be formed?

Pentecost is not just a moment in history. It is an ongoing invitation. The early believers devoted themselves to four essential practices: the apostles' teaching, fellowship, the breaking of bread, and prayer (Acts 2:42). These were not occasional activities, but the foundation of their shared life. From this foundation grew something remarkable, a community marked by deep connection, radical generosity, and spiritual vitality. They learned together. They supported one another. They worshiped with sincerity and joy. They lived in a way that made God's presence visible. And people noticed. Perhaps this is where the story meets us most clearly. The same Spirit that moved among those first believers is still at work today, gathering, empowering, and transforming. The question is not whether the Spirit is present, but whether we are open. May we be people who make space, who listen, who trust that God is still doing new and surprising things. And may we, like those first believers, discover what becomes possible when we live not just with belief, but with shared purpose, open hearts, and expectant faith.

## From The President's Desk, May 2026 Peter Antonie

Since mid-February the council has been working on solutions for how decisions are made, by whom, and for what reason. We determined that a key factor is open, honest and transparent communication, along with clear guidelines for what decisions need council approval. You have the right to be well informed, feel a part of the decision-making process, and have ample opportunity to voice your opinion before major decisions are made. No more "sweeping things under the rug." No more decisions in a vacuum.

To that end, at our council meeting on April 26th, we approved the following procedure to be used by our Teams and Committees:

**Decision Making-** Items that need to be approved by council prior to implementation

1. Physical Changes- All physical changes that were not approved at the annual meeting, a congregational meeting, or previous council meeting that affect the appearance of any area in the church or on the grounds and/or is a permanent change, need council approval (e.g., Physical changes that cannot be easily moved to another area or taken out of the area completely).

\*\* All approved physical changes will be communicated via News from the Pews, team bulletin board, and/or verbally to the congregation prior to and close to the time of implementation.

2. Any new temporary or permanent physical changes, events or activities that involve multiple teams/committees need council approval or approval at the Quarterly Team Meetings. (e.g., an event/activity that is not a previously established church sponsored event, or any rearranging of storage areas or furniture).

3. Any amount of money exceeding a team's/committee's approved budget needs council approval, or if the team/committee does not have a previously approved budget.

4. Anything that a team/committee would like to ask the council to approve of can be brought to the council. Things to be noted:

- For teams/committees, such as the Mission team, who operate by only disbursing what they bring in for the year, they will submit a summary of spendings/distributions to the council at year end.
- Teams/committees who receive a donation to complete a task or event will submit information about the donation and what it was used for to the council, so council members are aware and can provide information to the donator if he/she asks how things are going.
- Council meets on the 4th Sunday of each month. Information needing approval needs to be emailed to the executive committee (council president, council vice-president, treasurer and secretary) by the Tuesday before the council meeting. If an item is time-sensitive and needs immediate attention, the council can vote via email which will be confirmed at the next in-person council meeting. Immediate approval items should be emailed to the executive committee as soon as possible.

In addition to the decision-making matrix, the council dealt with several other issues, including:

Approved a recommendation from the Legacy Fund committee to amend the Legacy Fund resolution such that:

- Purchase of additional property is stricken from the resolution as a purpose of the Fund.

- Payment of the Fund's fair share of the church's operating expenses attributable to the maintenance and development of the Prairie and Woodland is added as a purpose of the Fund.
- Sale of all or any portion of the Prairie & Woodland to provide funds for the normal operating or benevolence expenses of the church is not permitted unless an emergency is declared by the council and approved by a 2/3 majority vote at a duly called congregational meeting

Approved a proposal from the Legacy Fund committee to support a Black Earth Creek Watershed Association (BECWA) project to build a table-sized 3-D model of the watershed for educational purposes with a matching funds donation of \$500 for any congregation member donations to the project.

Approved the creation of an ad hoc "Vitality Task Force" (Ingerid Kvam, Frannie Parrell, Nancy Berkas & Debbie Krebs) to meet once per month with leadership consultant, Sara Schulting Kranz, for three one-hour sessions via Zoom to further our plans to strengthen our communication with the congregation, the decision-making process guidelines, and the development of a set of agreed upon shared values within the congregation.

Approved the balanced budget strategic plan set forth by Karsten Haugen's balanced budget task force, including the recent stewardship "temple talks," provided by Paul Ohlrogge and Joanie Haugen, and the forthcoming after-worship opportunities for you to have your questions answered and concerns addressed about the budget shortfall.

As always, on behalf of the council, team leaders and committee chairpersons who are working hard to keep things moving forward, I want to thank everyone in the congregation for your patience and trust that, with God's help and guidance, brighter days are ahead.

**VLC GIVING.** We are grateful for the many ways people support the ministry of our church. Giving is one expression of faith and care, and every gift—of time, talent, or financial resources—helps sustain our shared mission. # Council Member Feature



## Peter Antonie

For more than four decades, Peter Antonie has been a steady and faithful presence in our congregation. A member for 41 years, Peter's connection to this church began in a moment of hardship—after the 1984 Black Earth tornado damaged his family's home. During that difficult time, neighbors invited Peter and his family to a simple act of hospitality: a church meal. That welcome left a lasting impression and ultimately led them to become part of this community—a place they've called home ever since.

Peter and his wife, Kris, have built a full and active life centered on faith and family. They have three adult children and three grandchildren, with two daughters, Beth and Carolyn, and their families nearby and connected to the church, and a son, Patrick, in Minneapolis. In his free time, Peter enjoys fishing (especially for walleyes in Canada), gardening, caring for prairie land on his property, and cheering on the Badgers and Packers. A former marathon runner and avid golfer, he now spends his days enjoying a good book, time outdoors, and tossing a frisbee for his Black Lab, Kiera.

Peter brings a wealth of professional experience to his leadership. After a 30-year career working with school districts across Wisconsin through the WEA Insurance Trust, he later served as a compliance specialist in Madison. His thoughtful, steady approach carries into his role as Council President, where he helps guide meetings, ensure responsibilities are fulfilled, and foster an environment of respect, trust, and open communication. In addition to his council role, Peter is deeply involved across the life of the church—serving as chair of both the Care for Creation Team and the Legacy Fund Committee, and as a member of the Visibility & Marketing Team. His commitment reflects a belief that being part of a congregation means actively using one's time and talents for the good of others.

When asked where he sees God at work, Peter points to a season of healing—one marked by patience, perseverance, and renewed strength through faithful leadership and the sharing of the Good News. Looking ahead, his hopes are both simple and powerful: that the congregation continues to be welcoming and united, and that a new pastor will soon be called to lead with energy and vision.

Grounded in beloved scriptures like Psalm 23 and John 3:16, and inspired by hymns such as How Great Thou Art and Amazing Grace, Peter's faith is woven into both his leadership and daily life.

Creative outreach remains an important focus. Efforts like a local billboard campaign and hosting large community events have brought new faces onto our property. Each interaction is an opportunity to extend hospitality and share a glimpse of life at Vermont.

Part of that story is also written in the land we steward. The Legacy Prairie and Woodlands continue to draw visitors for hiking, reflection, and learning, and we hope to welcome even more in the days ahead. With QR codes along the trails and in the cemetery, guests can explore the history and purpose of this space in a deeper, more meaningful way.

The work of the Visibility Team is ongoing. They continue to explore new ways to communicate, invite, and connect—always seeking to better tell the story of Vermont Church. Through their efforts, the work of this congregation becomes more visible, helping others discover a place of welcome, community, and belonging.

**LEGACY FUND COMMITTEE.** The Black Earth Creek Watershed Association (BECWA) is building creek watershed 3D model and is fund raising for the cost of the project. Being the Vermont Creek is part of the watershed and the activities on the Legacy prairie and woodland are good examples of creek watershed preservation, they asked if we'd be will to support the effort. We do want to support the project and have decided to match member contributions to BECWA up to \$500. More information will be share for Earth Day.

Several modifications to the Legacy Resolution are being purposed to council. The 4 main modifications are to revise the description of the Prairie and Woodland after the recent acquisitions, removing the clause to be able to buy more land, add wording for Legacy to provide for shared church costs (i.e. insurance, electric and bookkeeping), and to revise the wording describing emergency use of the funds to include the land.

We reviewed our spring projects to make sure things are still moving forward and to confirm activities are all a part of our budget/plan brought forward at the annual meeting.

We discussed the results of the recent Aspen logging. While some aspects of the project were expected, fewer logs were removed than expected. Those trees were cut down as expected but left in the woods causing some sections to have more downfall than wanted. We'll be working on plans to remediate and also working on a communication plan to show how much of the downfall is consistent with our forestry plan.

Improvement in trail map pamphlets and trail signs were discussed. Some immediate improvement will be made to the pamphlets to include Cushman property and the wetland trails.

We did some additional planning and discussion on a future bridge across the creek. Bridge variation, permitting, wetland studies, and cost where are discussed. We are also contacting an expert in creek building who may be able to help us through some of the processes.

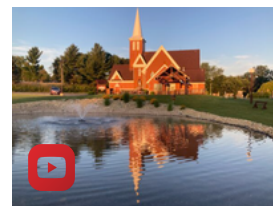
